In line with the CAPTIVE partners, CU will deliver cultural/GBV awareness raising sessions with services and communities and participate in sharing insights, international meetings and development of protocols and recommendations over the course of the project.
Staff involved in CAPTIVE	Dr. Lorna O'Doherty is a Senior Research Fellow with expertise in intimate partner violence and health. She has led systematic reviews of interventions for identifying abuse and conducted a large randomized control trial of a counseling intervention by family doctors. She has worked locally to examine different community based intervention for survivors of violence from black and ethnic minority communities and contributed to work by the Coventry Migrant and Refugee Centre to examine gaps in service provision for female victims of sexual violence. She is also an experienced qualitative researcher and has published an extensive set of studies on women's experiences of IPV and barriers to accessing support. She has also published on the subject of responding to disclosure of IPV in health settings.
	Erica Bowen is a Professor of Prevention of Violence and Abuse based at the Institute of Health & Society at Worcester University. She has been researching violence in intimate relationships since 2000. Her research has examined the efficacy of probation-based interventions for adult make offenders. Subsequently she has also written innovative brief interventions for adult offender groups. She has also led an EC Daphne III funded Action Grant project 'Changing Attitudes towards dating violence in Adolescents' (CAVA) in which a serious games-based primary intervention was developed and piloted with partners in Belgium, Sweden and Germany. Prof. Bowen has more than 15 years experience of training professionals on issues relating to GBV, having alas previously secured funding to develop training courses in this area.
	Claire Pillinger is a Research Assistant with 10 years experience working on various funded research projects which include an evaluation of support for older adults experiencing domestic violence and abuse, a Fullbright Scholarship project exploring family experience and justice in cases of death after police contact in the USA and UK and a Home Office funded project exploring the characteristics and motivations of child sexual



	exploitation offenders. Claire is an experienced qualitative researcher with experience interviewing both victims and perpetrators of crime and she has been actively involved in the delivery and evaluation of interventions for adults and children.
